The Horse

· Instructor's training and skills relating to equines needs and traits

- Equine psychology
- Herd dynamics and interaction
- Setting horse up for success = participant success
- Why the horse with PTSD
 - Prey animal- hypervigilance
 - In the moment
 - Honest communication
 - Non-verbals similar to humans
 - · Relationship more "earned" than other animals



Teaching & Skill Progression

Teaching Techniques- adapt to the needs of the participant

- · Teach to what you see- look for teachable moments
 - Each day may be different for the human (and horse!)
- Not just "whats" but "hows" and "whys"
- Multiple ways of breaking down & explaining skills (task analysis)
- · Teach to all learning styles- auditory, visual, kinesthetic
- Lead by example

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- Facilitating participant progression
 - Human first- teach them, not the dx.
 - Allow for independence- capable adults
 - · Strive for "zone of proximal development"- setting human up for success
 - Modify: horse, activity, environment, physical or verbal support, etc.
 - Progression happens at different rates



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Sample activities & progression

Horsemanship skills based

- Safety
- Ethical partnering with horses
- Maintains training and wellbeing of horses- diversifies ability to work in different types of programs
- Helps Equine Professional stay in their "lane" not crossing to therapy
- Personality and learning type of participant (ex: military, first responder, etc.)- comfort of structure
- Follow a "traditional" horsemanship skills progression and pattern
 - Easy to duplicate and maintain consistency (daily, weekly, group to group)
 - Allows for daily predictability but also teachable moments
 - · Clear structure gives more freedom to be in the moment
 - Sample:
 - Approach and haltering
 - Grooming
 - Leading
 - Round Pen or Longe Line
 - "Extras"- stretching, desensitization, join ups, lateral work in hand, long lining or ground driving
 - Barn chores
 - What about riding?
